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Ellen G. White was wrong, therefore she was not and is not a prophetess of God. One mistake disqualifies her from being one of God's prophets. All the rest of her teaching is irrelevant. Even though Elle G. White claimed to speak for God, she did not. Ellen G. White suffered under a delusion and has led millions of people astray with her false teaching.

Jesus Christ is the True Prophet

The Bible speaks of Jesus as God's greatest and final Prophet. His coming was predicted centuries in advance by hundreds of very specific prophecies in the Old Testament, and His work to save us from judgment is set forth in the New Testament.

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What Must I Do to Be Saved?

You have broken God's Holy Law, His Ten Commandments (Exodus, chapter 20). If you will be honest with yourself, you have lied, stolen, and coveted, and by doing all these things, you have dishonored your father and mother. And if you will be even more honest with yourself, you have broken all the others, too.

You've got a problem, my friend. And it's a serious problem, because the penalty for breaking God's Law is death, and not just physical death. The penalty is eternal death, separation from God in a place that you really don't want to go to. But there's some good news. In fact, it's great news. That eternal penalty has already been paid. God Himself paid it and paved the road for our salvation through Jesus Christ.

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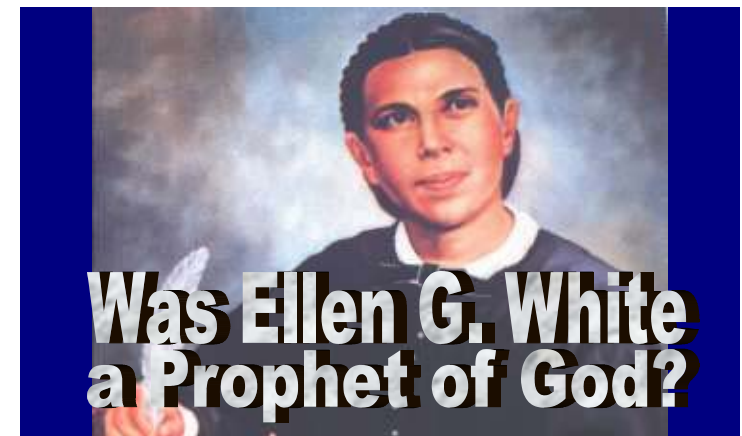
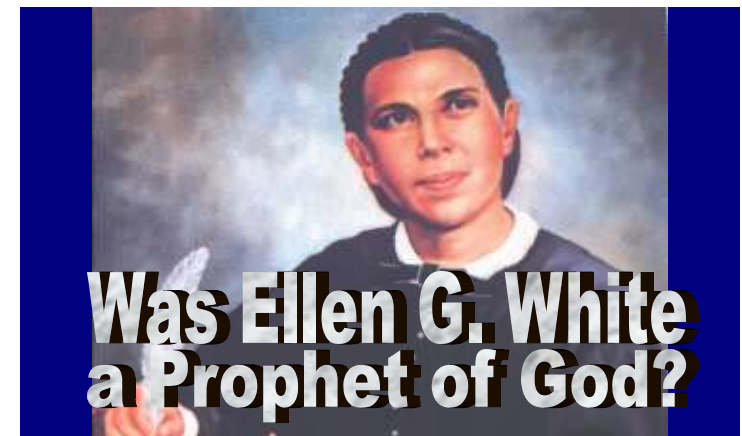

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The question of Ellen G. White's prophethood is a vital issue. If she is not a prophet sent from God, then her teachings are false, the Seventh Day Adventist Church upon which her teachings are based is a false church, and it must be exposed as a fraud. All Adventists must be presented with God's standards for prophets, as set forth in the Bible.¹

If anyone does not listen to my words that the prophet speaks in my name, I myself will call him to account. But a prophet who presumes to speak in my name anything I have not commanded him to say, or a prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, must be put to death. — Deuteronomy 18:19-20

2 Of course, God has anticipated the problem of identifying just

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who a prophet of God would be. In a word, a prophet can be identified by the accuracy of his (or her) predictions:

You may say to yourselves, 'How can we know when a message has not been spoken by the Lord?' If what a prophet proclaims in the name of the Lord does not take place or come true, that is a message the Lord has not spoken. That prophet has spoken presumptuously. Do not be afraid of him. —Deuteronomy 18:21-22

It is a simple matter to compare the predictions of Ellen G. White with what actually occurred in history. White predicted the Second Coming of Christ in her lifetime (in 1843, 1845, 1850...). He never came. White is therefore a false prophet.

Here is what Ellen G. White said about the Second Coming: **3**

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We heard the voice of God like many waters, which gave us the day and hour of Jesus' coming.²... I have seen that the 1843 chart was directed by the hand of the Lord and that it should not be altered, that the figures were as he wanted them.³

Notwithstanding White's "chart" and her claim that the day and hour were "as he wanted them," these particular prophecies never came to pass.

Ellen G. White's other false prophecies are too numerous to mention here. Use any Internet search engine (e.g., google.com) and search on "false prophecies of Ellen G. White") to find many more. **4**

I was shown the company present at the Conference. Said the angel: "Some food for worms, some subjects of the seven last plagues, some will be alive and remain upon the earth to be translated at the coming of Jesus."²

In her early career Mrs. White was noted for her predictions about Christ's imminent return. One of the few times when Mrs. White made a *specific* prediction of a future event was her prediction of Christ's return made at a conference in 1856. She claimed that some of those present would be translated (*i.e.*, taken directly to heaven at the rapture). Of course, they are all dead now.

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What we have seen and heard of the pestilence, is but the beginning of what we shall see and hear. Soon the dead and dying will be all around us.²

In the summer of 1849, a local pestilence struck the region where White lived. Mrs. White, seeing this as a fulfillment of prophecy indicating the end of the world, predicted this pestilence would soon become widespread. Not long after this prophecy was penned, the pestilence ended and the United States entered a period of relative peace and prosperity that lasted for many years.

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My accompanying angel said, "Time is almost finished. Get ready, get ready, get ready."...now time is almost finished... and what we have been years learning, they will have to learn in a few months.²...the time for Jesus to be in the most Holy place was nearly finished, and that ...the sealing time is very short and soon will be over.³

Mrs. White was saying that the truths that she and her associates had spent five years learning would have to be learned by new converts in only a few months. By September of 1850, Mrs. White was warning that Jesus was nearly finished in the Most Holy Place.

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God Confirmed His Prophets by Miracles

When God sent Moses to the Israelites, He not only gave him miracles to give him credibility, He also talked to Moses from the mountain, and thousands heard God speaking to him. Also,

- Miriam and Aaron heard the voice of God talking about Moses as a prophet.
- After John the Baptist baptized Jesus, everyone heard the voice of God saying that this is His beloved Son (Luke 3:22).
- On the Mount of Transfiguration, a voice came from heaven and spoke about Jesus. Peter, James and John were with Jesus and heard this voice, too. (Matthew 17:1-8)

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
